Courses Taught

- 2018–2019 Academic Year Lecturer, Social Science Inquiry I-III
- This is a three-quarter core sequence in the College at The University of Chicago. In this sequence, students gain a first exposure to empirical social science, with a focus on quantitative methods. The first quarter focuses on the motivation, intuition, and logic of empirical social science. The second quarter is an in-depth look at specifically quantitative methods, taught in the R statistical programming language. In the third quarter, students build on what they have learned by planning and executing their own research project.

- This is an intensive course for incoming first-year master’s students in the social sciences.
